#### NOTIFICATIONS

The 27th November, 2025.

**No.EDN.208/2025/1.** - Whereas the State Government recognizes that Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) is essential for strengthening institutional resilience and ensuring long-term financial sustainability by reducing dependence on Government funding, enhancing the capacity for self-support in maintenance and development, improving academic excellence, fostering industry collaboration, and promoting staff welfare through an appropriate incentive and reward mechanism;

Now, therefore, the Government of Meghalaya is pleased to introduce the Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) Scheme for implementation in all Government Engineering Colleges and Government Polytechnics of the State, as detailed below:

#### 1. Short title and commencement

- (a) The Scheme shall be called 'Internal Revenue Generation Scheme for Government Engineering Colleges and Polytechnics 2025'.
- (b) It shall come into force with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> December, 2025.
- (c) It shall be applicable to all the Government Engineering Colleges and Polytechnics and any other educational institution of the State as notified by the Department.

#### 2. Definitions — In this scheme, unless the context otherwise requires:

- i. "Advisory Committee" means the Committee constituted under Clause 5.
- ii. "Committee" means the Institutional IRG Committee constituted under Clause 3.
- iii. "Department" means Education Department.
- iv. "DHTE" means Directorate of Higher & Technical Education, Shillong.
- v. "Fund" means Institutional Development Fund (IDF) created under Clause 9.
- vi. "Institution" means Polytechnic or Engineering College.
- vii. "IRG" means Internal Revenue Generation.
- viii. "Scheme" means Internal Revenue Generation Scheme for Government Engineering Colleges and Polytechnics 2025.
- ix. "State" means State of Meghalaya.

### 3. Institutional IRG Committee - Composition

To operationalise and oversee the Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) activities, every Government Polytechnic and the Government Engineering College in Meghalaya shall constitute an Institutional IRG Committee. This Committee will function as the apex body within the institution for planning, monitoring, evaluating, and expanding IRG initiatives.

The Committee shall consist of the following members:

- (a) Principal of the Institution- Chairperson/Chief Coordinator  
Responsible for overall leadership, strategic direction, approval of IRG initiatives, and ensuring alignment with Government policies and institutional priorities.
- (b) All Heads of Departments (HoDs) - Members  
Represent departmental capabilities; identify opportunities for consultancy, testing, training, and other IRG activities within their respective disciplines.
- (c) One Senior Faculty Member (preferably the senior-most non-technical faculty or as applicable) - Member  
Ensures representation of general studies, humanities, science, or applied disciplines, promoting a holistic institutional approach.
- (d) IRG Coordinator (appointed by the Principal) - Member Secretary  
Serves as the operational focal point for IRG activities; responsible for convening meetings, processing proposals, maintaining records, coordinating programmes, and liaising with the State Government as required.
- (e) Finance & Procurement Coordinator - Member  
Provides guidance on budgeting, financial compliance, revenue accounting, procurement procedures, and financial oversight of IRG activities.
- (f) Hostel Superintendent - Member  
Supports IRG activities related to residential facilities, short-term training participants, and utilisation of hostel infrastructure where required.
- (g) Workshop Superintendent - Member  
Oversees workshop-based IRG activities, testing services, vocational training, fabrication units, and ensures safety and maintenance of tools and machines.
- (h) Training-cum-Placement Officer (TCPO) - Member  
Facilitates industry linkages, identifies market-driven training opportunities, and promotes IRG programmes to employers and external agencies.

### 4. Functions of the IRG Committee

The Institutional Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) Committee shall serve as the primary body responsible for planning, coordinating, monitoring, and strengthening all IRG-related initiatives within the institution. Its functions shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- (i) Conduct demand-driven surveys to identify opportunities for consultancy, testing services, training programmes, and other revenue-generating activities aligned with industry and community needs,
- (ii) Publicise, promote, and create awareness of IRG activities through appropriate communication channels to ensure maximum participation and outreach,

- (iii) Constitute sub-committees or activity-specific groups for effective planning and execution of IRG programmes,
- (iv) Develop and notify norms, procedures, and eligibility criteria for admission into continuing education and other fee-based programmes,
- (v) Scrutinise, evaluate, and accord approval to proposals submitted by Programme Coordinators or departments for undertaking IRG activities.
- (vi) Sanction and release funds required for implementation of approved IRG programmes and ensure adherence to financial norms,
- (vii) Monitor implementation, review progress, and prepare periodic performance reports, including financial statements and activity outcomes,
- (viii) Collect and analyse feedback from participants, stakeholders, and departments to improve the quality and impact of IRG initiatives,
- (ix) Recommend revisions or modifications to the IRG Policy to keep it dynamic, responsive, and aligned with emerging institutional and industry requirements,
- (x) Oversee all IRG activities and ensure timely reporting to the Government, including annual reviews and compliance documentation,
- (xi) Ensure preventive maintenance of institutional equipment and laboratories to minimise wastage and optimise asset utilisation,
- (xii) Organise affordable training programmes for unemployed and underemployed youth as part of the institution's community outreach and skill development mandate,
- (xiii) Determine and approve fee structures for hiring institutional facilities, equipment, laboratories, auditoriums, and other services,
- (xiv) Facilitate any additional activity deemed necessary for the effective implementation, expansion, or sustainability of IRG initiatives.

## **5. Advisory Committee**

To ensure uniformity, accountability, and strategic oversight of Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) initiatives across all Government Polytechnics and the Government Engineering College in Meghalaya, a State-level IRG Advisory Committee shall be constituted under the Directorate of Higher & Technical Education (DHTE). This Committee shall guide policy direction, promote best practices, and ensure alignment of institutional IRG activities with the development priorities of the State.

### **5.1. Functions of the Advisory Committee**

The State-level Advisory Committee shall:

- i) Review institutional IRG performance annually, based on reports submitted by the Institutional IRG Committees, including financial statements, activity outcomes, challenges, and best practices,
- ii) Examine and recommend proposals requiring State Government approval for certification or accreditation of courses introduced under IRG or continuing education programmes.
- iii) Provide strategic guidance to institutions on industry engagement, consultancy models, revenue diversification, and capacity building,
- iv) Ensure coordination among departments, especially between Education, Industry, and other stakeholder agencies, to strengthen IRG opportunities and remove procedural bottlenecks.
- v) Advise on policy reforms, resource-sharing frameworks, and mechanisms to enhance quality, accountability, and transparency in IRG operations across institutions.

## 5.2. Composition of the Advisory Committee

The Committee shall comprise the following members:

- Additional Director/Joint Director (Technical), DHTE – Chairperson
- Financial Adviser, Education Department – Member
- Principal of a Government Polytechnic – Member
- Principal of Shillong Government Engineering College – Member
- Director of Industries & Commerce, or authorised representative – Member
- Industrialist or Prominent Businessperson (nominated by DHTE) – Member
- One Head of Department (from a Government Polytechnic/SGEC, nominated by the Chairperson) – Member
- IRG Coordinator (DHTE or nominated institutional representative) - Member Secretary

## 6. Rules for Implementation of IRG Programmes

To ensure effective, transparent, and academically sound implementation of Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) activities across all Government Polytechnics and the Government Engineering College of Meghalaya, the following rules shall apply:

- 1) **Scope of Participation:** There shall be no upper limit on the number or scale of IRG activities that faculty members or staff may undertake. However, each activity must receive prior approval from the Institutional IRG Committee to ensure alignment with institutional priorities and compliance with established norms.
- 2) **Protection of Core Academic Duties:** IRG engagements must not, under any circumstances, interfere with or diminish the normal academic, administrative, or service responsibilities of faculty and staff. Academic delivery, student services, and institutional functions shall remain the highest priority.
- 3) **Permissible Timings for IRG Activities:** IRG programmes may be conducted on holidays, weekends, and before or after regular working hours. Institutions may also utilise semester breaks or vacations to organise training programmes, testing services, consultancy assignments, and other IRG-related work.
- 4) **Remuneration to Faculty and Staff:** Faculty and staff participating in IRG programmes may receive remuneration, with the total earnings from IRG activities capped at an amount not exceeding their annual gross salary in a financial year. This provision encourages staff participation while maintaining financial safeguards.
- 5) **Use of Institutional Facilities:** All IRG activities must be conducted using the institution's infrastructure, equipment, laboratories, workshops, software, and other assets. This ensures optimum utilisation of Government-funded facilities and strengthens the institution's capacity to generate resources.
- 6) **Compliance with Financial and Administrative Procedures:** All IRG activities shall follow transparent accounting mechanisms, proper documentation, and institutional financial procedures as outlined in the IRG Policy and State Government guidelines.

## 7. Suggested IRG Activities

To broaden and strengthen institutional revenue streams, all institutions are encouraged to undertake a diverse range of Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) activities aligned with their academic capabilities, available infrastructure, community needs, and evolving industry expectations. The following categories are indicative and not exhaustive:

- 1) **Testing and Certification Services:** Institutions may offer testing, analysis, measurement, calibration, or certification services using available laboratories, equipment, software, and technical expertise. These services may be extended to Government agencies, private organisations, community bodies, and individuals, based on institutional capacity and approved norms.
- 2) **Consultancy Services:** Institutions may undertake consultancy assignments in areas relevant to their academic strengths, including:
  - Technical or academic consultancy for organisations and individuals
  - Organisation of seminars, workshops, conferences, and customised training programmes
  - Professional advisory services, problem-solving support, or project-based consultancy
  - Assistance in conducting examinations or assessment-related activities
  - Preparation of training modules, skill-gap studies, or developmental reports
- 3) **Continuing Education and Skill Development Programmes:** Institutions may design and deliver:
  - Short-term training programmes
  - Continuing education courses
  - Skill development and upskilling programmes
  - Certificate courses aligned with contemporary needs, industry expectations, or emerging technologies

These programmes may be open to students, working professionals, community members, and unemployed youth.

- 4) **Hiring of Institutional Facilities:** Institutions may hire out approved facilities, subject to institutional norms and availability. These may include:
  - Auditoriums, seminar halls, or multipurpose halls
  - Smart classrooms, training rooms, or IT-enabled spaces
  - Parking areas (where feasible)
  - Canteen or food kiosks
  - Library or reading room facilities for short-term programmes
  - Reprographic and document-related services (printing, photocopying, scanning, etc.)

All hiring shall follow a prescribed fee structure and usage guidelines approved by the IRG Committee.

- 5) **Production Centre and Workshop-Based Activities:** Institutions may operate production or service units utilising their laboratories, workshops, technical spaces, or specialised facilities. These activities should enhance practical learning, support community needs, and generate additional institutional revenue.
- 6) **Additional Activities:** Institutions may undertake any other revenue-generating activity that:
  - Falls within the academic, technical, or service mandate of the institution
  - Ensures safe, responsible, and judicious use of institutional facilities
  - Has been reviewed and approved by the Institutional IRG Committee

Such activities may be introduced as per emerging opportunities, institutional strengths, or community and industry demand.

**8. Pattern of Estimation of Project Cost or Pricing**

- 1) No Government fund will be utilised at any stage of the IRG or consultancy project.
- 2) The pattern or methodology of estimation of Project cost or Pricing is suggestive, only to offer advice on pricing of projects and will help the Institution by taking care of the prevailing market rate and competitive conditions. The pattern or methodology may be evaluated and reformed time to time by the Institute and will be approved by the IRG Committee
- 3) Where elements of the Projects work cannot be delivered by Institute faculty or staff and external service (except labour payment) need to be brought into the project, then the procurement of service must be done in compliance with extant guidelines. Such payment should not exceed 25% of the total amount contracted for the project and should be paid from the concerned project cost.
- 4) There will be maximum four (04) major components in estimation of project cost which are detailed below.
  - a. Direct Expenditure: It is the actual expenditure required to execute the work which involves purchase of materials, use of labour/expertise, hiring of vehicle, hiring of invigilators, etc.
  - b. Consultancy Charges: Consultancy charges shall be minimum 10% of the direct expenditure.
  - c. Overhead Charges. It involves indirect costs such as electricity and utilization of the infrastructure of the Institute. This charge would be 15% of the direct expenditure.
  - d. Taxes shall be calculated as applicable.
- 5) Utilization of the Project Cost:
  - a. The amount of direct expenditure would be provided with the concerned working team or concerned HoD to execute the work along with submission of utilization as per Government norms.
  - b. The overhead charges as derived and received would be deposited to Treasury as Government revenue by the Institute. For first five years from the date of notification of this scheme, the overhead charges shall be deposited into Institutional Development Fund.
  - c. For any project, 50% of consultancy charges shall be transferred to Institutional Development Fund and rest 50% shall be shared by the team and individual involved with the works as Consultancy charge. However, the IRG Committee may approve higher share for the team subject to a maximum of 65%.
  - d. The distribution of the consultancy charge among faculty members & staff shall be approved by the IRG Committee as per contribution to the project in terms of quality and time.

**9. Guidelines for operation of the Institutional Development Fund (IDF)**

To ensure transparency, accountability, and effective utilisation of Internal Revenue Generation (IRG) resources, every institution shall operate an Institutional Development Fund (IDF) in accordance with the following guidelines:

- 1) Fixation of Fees and Charges: All fees for consultancy services, testing and certification, continuing education programmes, hiring of facilities, production centre services, and any other IRG-related activity shall be fixed, reviewed, and approved by the Institutional IRG Committee. Fee structures must be competitive, reasonable, and reflective of market value and institutional capacity.
- 2) No Separate Government Allocation: The IRG Scheme shall be implemented without any additional financial allocation from the State Government. Institutions must operate IRG initiatives using existing infrastructure, equipment, and human resources.

- 3) Maintenance of Separate IDF Account: Each institution shall maintain a separate Institutional Development Fund (IDF) account exclusively for the deposit and utilisation of IRG-related receipts and expenditure. This account shall not be merged with any other institutional or Government fund.
- 4) Advance Collection of Fees: All fees for IRG activities must be collected in full and in advance, unless otherwise approved by the IRG Committee under special circumstances. Fees shall be promptly credited to the IDF account.
- 5) Issuance of Official Receipts: A proper and serially numbered official receipt must be issued for every payment received under any IRG activity. Duplicate records shall be maintained for audit and verification.
- 6) Separate Books of Accounts: Dedicated cashbooks, ledgers, and registers shall be maintained for all IRG transactions. Accounting entries must clearly reflect the source of revenue, activity-wise collections, and expenditure categories.
- 7) Separate Bank Account: All IRG revenues shall be deposited into a designated bank account maintained solely for the IDF. Withdrawals shall be made only for activities approved by the IRG Committee.
- 8) Internal Audit: The IDF account and all IRG transactions shall undergo periodic internal audit to ensure financial propriety, transparency, and compliance with Government financial rules.
- 9) Financial and Administrative Autonomy of Principal: The Principal of the institution shall have full financial and administrative authority to utilise IDF funds strictly as per the approvals granted by the IRG Committee. Utilisation must support institutional priorities and align with the IRG Policy.

#### **10. Areas of Institutional Development Under IRG**

The resources accumulated in the Institutional Development Fund shall be utilised for improving and strengthening the academic, administrative, and infrastructural capacity of the institution. The following activities are permitted:

- 1) Maintenance of equipment, machinery, tools, and laboratory instruments to ensure optimal functionality.
- 2) Replacement of obsolete or non-functional equipment to maintain modern and industry-relevant facilities.
- 3) Minor repair and renovation works, including upkeep of classrooms, workshops, laboratories, and essential services.
- 4) Training and professional development of faculty and staff, including attending workshops, conferences, industrial training, and specialised courses.
- 5) Capacity enhancement initiatives, such as increasing intake in specific programmes or upgrading teaching-learning facilities.
- 6) Upgradation of computers, software, and peripherals, ensuring compatibility with current technological standards.
- 7) Development of new training modules, short-term courses, and extension activities aligned with industry and community needs.
- 8) Any other developmental activity deemed appropriate and essential by the IRG Committee for academic, infrastructural, or institutional advancement.

#### **11. Essential Transformation for Successful IRG**

Successful Internal Resource Generation requires a foundational transformation across key areas within the Engineering College and Polytechnic. The necessary parameters are detailed in the table below:

## Parameters for Successful Internal Resource Generation (IRG):

Faculty	1. Well-trained, motivated faculty teams.

- 12. Exception:** Notwithstanding anything contained in this Scheme or the guidelines, the Advisory Committee may, in exceptional cases, propose any deviation from the guidelines for the approval of the Education Department.
- 13. Amendment:** The Department may, based on the recommendations of the Advisory Committee or as deemed necessary, amend any provision of this Scheme through a duly issued notification. The Department may also extend the applicability of this Scheme to any other institution in the State as considered appropriate.

**No.WM(G)32/2010/Pt/123.** - The draft Meghalaya Legal Metrology (Enforcement) (Amendment) Rules, 2024 which the Governor of Meghalaya proposes to make in exercise of the powers conferred by section 53 (1) of the Legal Metrology Act, 2009 (Central Act No.1 of 2010) is hereby published as required by sub-section (4) of section 53, for the information of all the persons likely to be affected thereby. Notice is hereby given that the said draft will be taken into consideration after thirty days from the date of its publication in the Official Gazette.

**No.WM(G)32/2010/Pt/121.** - In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 53 of the Legal Metrology Act, 2009 (No.1 of 2010) and with the approval of the Government of India, the Governor of Meghalaya is pleased to amend The Meghalaya Legal Metrology (Enforcement) Rules, 2011 as follows:-

1. **Short title and commencement:** (1) These Rules may be called The Meghalaya Legal Metrology (Enforcement) (Amendment) Rules, 2024.  
(2) They shall come into force at once.
2. **Amendment of Schedule XI:-** In Schedule XI to the Meghalaya Legal Metrology (Enforcement) Rules, 2011 for the following penal sections and nature of offences, the compounding fee shall be substituted as follows –

**No.SW(S)77/90/Pt.II(C)/136.** - In pursuance of this Department's Notification No.SW(S)77/90/Pt.II (B)/26, dated 31<sup>st</sup> October, 2024, the Governor of Meghalaya is pleased to specify the powers and functions of the Mission Director, Drug Reduction Elimination & Action Mission (DREAM).

As per provisions of the Notification as aforementioned, Mission Director shall have the following powers and perform functions as listed hereunder:-

**1. Strategic Leadership & Policy Implementation**

- Oversee the overall vision, strategy and execution of the DREAM Mission.
- Develop policies and frameworks in line with state and national drug prevention strategies.
- Ensure alignment of DREAM Mission initiatives with government and community objectives.
- All official correspondences, approvals and file movements related to the Mission shall be routed through the Mission Director for review and necessary action to the Principal Secretary and Commissioner and Secretary before further processing.

**2. Coordination & Stakeholder Engagement**

- Serve as the principal coordinator between government departments, law enforcement, NGOs, and faith-based organizations.
  - Facilitate collaboration with health institutions, rehabilitation centers and social welfare agencies.
- Engage with local communities, traditional leaders (Dorbar Shnongs) and civil society organizations for grassroots-level interventions.

**3. Programme Development & Implementation**

- Design and oversee the implantation of de-addiction programs, awareness campaigns and rehabilitation efforts.
- Ensure the execution of community-driven substance abuse prevention initiatives.
- Expand and strengthen rehabilitation infrastructure, including setting up of detox centers & de-addiction Centres
- Develop a District Action Plan in collaboration with the District Social Welfare Officer (DSWO) through monthly district review meetings.

**4. Capacity Building & Training**

- Develop training modules for faith leaders, community workers, law enforcement and educators on drug abuse & substance abuse prevention and rehabilitation of drug users.
- Organize workshops and sensitization programs for different stakeholders.
- Strengthen human resources by facilitating institutional capacity building and collaboration for equipping frontline workers with essential skills.

**5. Monitoring & Impact Assessment**

- Establish mechanisms to track progress, assess programme effectiveness and identify policy gaps.
- Conduct data-driven evaluations and maintain a database of individuals in rehabilitation and recovery based on institutional and credible surveys.
- Ensure timely submission of reports from all partner organizations and institutions.

**6. Awareness & Advocacy**

- Drive large-scale awareness campaigns through media, educational institutions and social organizations.
- Advocate for policy changes and legislative measures to strengthen drug regulation and rehabilitation efforts.
- Encourage community participation in the fight against substance abuse.

**7. Law Enforcement & Regulation Support**

- Coordinate with the Home (Police) Department to identify hotspots and enhance enforcement measures.
- Coordinate for strengthening of surveillance and intelligence-sharing mechanisms to curb trafficking.
- Support initiatives of Police Department and Anti Narcotics agencies to continuously regulate and monitor illegal drug supply chains.

**8. Delegation of Financial Powers & Administrative arrangements for file movement**

1. The Mission Director, DREAM, shall be responsible for receiving grants from the Government of Meghalaya and managing the funds of the Mission in accordance with the financial norms of the State Government. This shall be strictly in line with the provisions and intent of the *Meghalaya Financial Rules & Subsidiary Rules* and the *Meghalaya Delegation of Financial Power Rules, 2006*.
  2. Allocate funds and resources effectively for prevention, rehabilitation and enforcement initiatives with further details regarding the custody of funds provided in **Annexure - A**.
  3. Ensure transparency and accountability in financial disbursement and expenditure and ensuring receipt of time-bound utilization certificates from implementing organizations and agencies with reports and photographs and supporting vouchers and bills duly submitted by the organizations and agencies receiving funds under DREAM for various purposes.
  4. In the absence upon leave not being casual leave or on official tours or training of Mission Director DREAM, the financial powers and authority to move files and process files and proposals, both administrative and financial shall vest with Additional Mission Director, DREAM subject to reference and approval of Competent Authority in the Department
  5. To ensure efficiency and clarity in decision-making:
    - o File initiation shall be limited to a single designated official from the Social Welfare Directorate.
    - o The proposal shall then be vetted by an official at the level of Assistant Director before submission to the Mission Director, DREAM.
    - o Based on delegated financial powers provided in **Annexure-A**, the Mission Director may approve and sanction the proposal or forward it to the **Commissioner & Secretary to the Government of Meghalaya, Social Welfare Department**, for further action and approval.
9. For all matters related to the **National Action Plan for Drug Demand Reduction (NAPDDR)**, including the **Nasha Mukt Bharat Abhiyaan** under the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, the **Director of Social Welfare** shall act as the **Nodal Authority** for implementation and execution.

10. All financial proposals under DREAM and NAPDDR shall be examined and cleared by the **Departmental Committee for Screening of Financial Proposals**, as per existing administrative procedures.
11. **Procurements above ` 50,000** must be placed before the **Departmental Tender Committee** for consideration and approval.
12. **Procurements below ` 50,000** may be executed by the Mission Director, DREAM, following competitive bidding norms, including invitation of quotations or adoption of approved rate lists from relevant State Government departments.
13. For travel within the State, Mission Director, DREAM will not require any formal approval from Competent Authority in Department and only intimation or tour programme communicated in advance to Social Welfare Department shall suffice. However, the same may have to be taken for travel on official purpose outside the state. Claims of travel and accommodation will be governed by entitlement admissible as per State Government norms and entitlements for Mission Director and the Substance Use Prevention Cell Unit.
14. As per State Government norms and entitlements, the Mission Director is responsible for the overall programme and financial management of the Substance Use Prevention Cell Unit. This includes oversight of personnel matters such as leave management, Travel Allowances (TA/DA), increments and incentive disbursements.
15. **Financial Management**
  - There shall be a dedicated savings bank account for DREAM for facilitation & disbursement of funds and for record of all financial transactions.
  - It would be operated as single signatory (Mission Director as single signatory) for amounts upto ` 50,000 and joint signatories in the bank account for cheque above ` 50,000 with signature required from Mission Director, DREAM & Commissioner & Secretary of Social Welfare Department as co-signatories.
  - Regular & routine transactions as per the delegation of financial powers will be done by Mission Director, DREAM for monthly utility charges with issuance of cheques upto ` 50,000.
  - For regular monthly charges like electricity charges, office expenses, minor expenditures relating to refreshments and out of pocket expenditure, Mission Director shall have full authority to authorize and approve expenditure.
  - Travelling Allowance and Daily Allowance entitlement and expenditure on outstation tours of Mission Director, DREAM shall be the same as entitlement of Group A Officer and for staff of DREAM as per entitlement of staff drawing salaries similarly in other Missions of the Government of Meghalaya.

Mission Director, DREAM shall take all steps for financial management, expenditure control and record maintenance by ensuring the following are effectively managed at the level of establishment of office of MD DREAM:

1. Bank Passbook and Bank Reconciliation Statement

5. Receipt/Vouchers/Bills
6. Monthly Reports
7. Statement of Expenditure
8. Utilization Certificates submitted by implementing agencies and organizations
9. Internal audit on an annual basis

**No.Health 158/2025/22.** - In exercise of the powers conferred by the *proviso* to Article 309 of the Constitution of India, the Governor of Meghalaya hereby makes the following rules further to amend the Meghalaya Health Services (Academic) Rules, 2025, namely:-

**1. Short Title and Commencement:** (1) These rules may be called the Meghalaya Health Services (Academic) (Amendment) Rules, 2025.

(2) They shall come into force with immediate effect.

**2. Amendment to Schedule II:** In Schedule II to the Meghalaya Health Services (Academic) Rules 2025,-

**(i) for entry at serial 6, for the post of Professor, the qualification, experiences etc. specified in column (8) shall be substituted as below -**

"(a) (i) Associate Professor in the subject for three years in a recognised medical institution; or

(ii) Specialist Medical Officer of the Armed Forces having at least three years of experience as Associate Professor in the relevant speciality in a teaching hospital of the Armed Forces; and

(b) (i) have published at least two research publications after becoming Associate Professor and must be amongst the first three authors.

(ii) have completed the Basic Course in Biomedical Research from a recognised medical institution; and

(iii) shall be required to undergo the Basic Course in Medical Education provided their broad specialty subject is covered under undergraduate training.

**Note 1:** In the case of Aviation Medicine and Marine Medicine, two years of experience as Flying Squadron for Aviation Medicine and two years of experience in a Diving and Escape Training School for Marine Medicine, shall be considered equivalent to one year of teaching experience as Associate Professor.

**Note 2:** A Senior Consultant, having three years of experience as postgraduate teacher of broad specialty or super specialty subject in the National Board of Examinations in Medical Sciences (NBEMS) recognized government medical institute shall be eligible to become Professor in a recognized medical institution of the concerned specialty and total number of years of experience as a Post Graduate teacher in National Board of Examinations in Medical Sciences (NBEMS) recognized government medical institute shall be considered as experience as Professor in a recognized medical institution.

**(ii) for entry at serial 7, for the post of Associate Professor, the qualification, experiences etc. specified in column (8) shall be substituted as below -**

"(a) (i) Assistant Professor in the subject for four years in a recognised medical institution or for five years for those appointed directly as Assistant Professor in Government medical institution; or

(ii) A Specialist Medical Officer of the Armed Forces, having at least five years of clinical experience in the relevant speciality after obtaining the recognised Postgraduate qualification in the subject, of which at least three years teaching experience as Assistant Professor in a teaching hospital of the Armed Forces; and

(b) (i) have published at least two research publications after becoming Assistant Professor and must be amongst the first three authors;

(ii) have completed the Basic Course in Biomedical Research from a recognised medical institution designated by the Commission; and

(iii) shall be required to undergo the Basic Course in Medical Education, provided their broad specialty subject is covered under undergraduate training.

**Note 1:** In the specialty of Aviation Medicine and Marine Medicine, a maximum of four years' experience in Flying Squadrons and in Diving and Escape Training Schools, respectively, will be considered equivalent to two years of teaching experience for becoming Associate Professor.

**Note 2:** A non-teaching Consultant or Specialist or Medical Officer, possessing a postgraduate medical degree with ten years of experience in at least a 220-bedded Government hospital, shall be eligible to become Associate Professor of that broad speciality and on such appointment, shall be required to undergo Basic Course in Biomedical Research within two years of the appointment."

**(iii) for entry at serial 8, for the post of Assistant Professor, the qualification, experiences etc. specified in column (8) shall be substituted as below -**

"(a) one year as Senior Resident in the concerned subject as specified in Rules 8 in a recognised medical institution.

**Note 1:** The requirement of one-year Senior Resident experience is relaxed for those appointed directly as Assistant Professor in Government medical institute immediately before the publication of these rules.

**Note 2:** The experience gained by a Tutor in a medical institution of his specialty, having a postgraduate degree, shall be considered equivalent to the experience required as a Senior Resident for the purpose of eligibility for the post of Assistant Professor.

**Note 3:** The experience gained by a Demonstrator in a medical institution of his specialty, having a Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degree, shall be considered equivalent to the experience required as a Senior Resident for the purpose of eligibility for the post of Assistant Professor; or

(b) Specialist Medical Officers of the Armed Forces having at least one year teaching experience or two years of clinical experience after obtaining the requisite postgraduate qualification in the concerned subject.

**Note:** In the specialty of Aviation Medicine and Marine Medicine, two years of such experience in Flying Squadrons and in Diving and Escape Training Schools respectively will be considered equivalent to one year of teaching experience (in lieu of Senior Resident) to become an Assistant Professor; or

(c) a non-teaching Consultant or Specialist or Medical Officer, possessing postgraduate medical degree with at least two years of experience in a Government hospital having at least 220 beds shall be eligible to become an Assistant Professor of that broad specialty without the requirement of experience as Senior Resident and shall complete the Basic Course in Biomedical Research within two years of appointment: or

(d) diploma holders appointed as Senior Residents in a recognised Medical Institution before 08.06.2017 having total experience of four years as Senior Resident; or

(e) diploma holders working as Specialist or Medical Officer in the respective departments of a government medical institution or Government medical institution running National Board of Examination and Medical Science recognised teaching programme having cumulative experience of six years."
